#### 5. Student Support and Progression

As mentioned earlier that though IQAC was yet to be conceived, the institution had a structured mechanism in place, constantly under the surveillance of the management to reach out to the students in terms of support services. That there was Health Insurance Policy in place (it still continues to be there), or for that matter scholarships for the physically challenged and the students of the backward / minority communities would be properly notified to the students through 'notice' and other media of communication. The institution would ever reach out to the guardian's of the physically challenged with the assurance of 'being extra sensitive' towards their wards, and would arrange class rooms convenient for them or for that matter lend all possible assistance for their academic requirements

5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

Though not exactly under the formal supervision of IQAC the institution's well oiled administrative machinery would relentlessly keep a vigil on whether the 'policy decision' in terms of providing support to the students was being properly implemented or not. For example, whether there was genuinely any bonafide claimant to Health Insurance Policy or for

that matter whether scholarships exclusively reserved for the students of backward/minority communities would be constantly monitored through the deputed teacher. The administration would also see to the fact that all relevant information regarding all these reaches its most important stakeholders at the earliest. The Principal, the deputed teacher for this purpose, the office would function in tandem to ensure that the policies adopted at the decision making level were being properly implemented on 'ground zero'

An overall feedback taken from students has been reviewed by the heads of different departments and has been only communicated to the academic subcommittee with individual 'notes' by the respective departmental heads. The academic plan as reflected in the academic calendar (prepared at the very beginning of the academic session) has been implemented in letter and spirit.

The mid-term tests have been conducted as per the guidelines of the university. Results of those have also been communicated to the students and subsequently the answer scripts have been shown to them with necessary advice from the respective departmental teachers. The performances of the students have also been communicated to the guardians in different meeting held with them, with the healthy reciprocity from either side regarding academic improvements of their wards.

7.3 Give two Best Practices of the institution (please see the format in the NAAC Self-study Manuals)

Title - Committed to the Cause of inclusive higher education that ensures holistic growth.

**Goal**: The goal of the institution is to ensure 'Inclusive Education Approach' of teaching – learning practice and thereby to inspire its students to prepare themselves for earning their livelihood and to become responsible citizens.

**Context**: The students who enrol here for higher education are first generation learners, (at the most second generation). Some of them even are breadwinners for their families. It is in this context that we realize that we have our task cut out for us

**Practice:** The department of Bengali Language and Literature can be credited with introducing 'self assessment' by the students themselves. Here the students are encouraged to check the answer scripts after the 'class tests' and identify for themselves their areas of strengths and weaknesses.

**Evidence of Success:** The performance of the Department of Commerce which happens to be the largest department, has also been satisfactory. It must be remembered in this context that the overhauling of the syllabi in Commerce has to some extent weaned away the ordinary students from the subject who find it difficult to grasp. If one parameter of success is employment then it needs to be mentioned that many former students of the Department of Journalism are employed in almost all the major media organizations of the state.

**Problems:** Constrains are too many. Paucity of space and available time are a constant and nagging reality of life that the institution has to live with. It needs to be mentioned here that ours is an evening college which has to share the same premises with the Day College which is much bigger in size.

Financial constraint is another reality that cannot be ignored. Many of our plans fail to actualize because of severe financial constraint. Often the disconnect between our wishes and the reality is because of our finances not being robust enough to take care of all our needs.

- Lack of individual computer laboratory for Commerce and Journalism Departments.
- Absence of a long-awaited Journalism Laboratory.
- Unsatisfactory drop-out rate in a few departments.

# **Opportunities**

- The college has adequate road and metro connectivity.
- The Department of Commerce is equipped with highly qualified and experienced faculties to embark on a post-graduation course.
- The former students of the college occupying teaching positions presently are a better job-fit compared to other recruits.
