**5. Student Support and Progression**

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

IQAC seeks to enhance the awareness about student support services across the institution through monitoring and documenting of certain specific activities:

- Another effort on NSS unit of the college is to maintain a database regarding students having same blood group so that any member of the college can seek blood donation from the list in case of emergency. A drive has been recently taken to test blood groups of students by a pathological laboratory. The database has also been uploaded in college website.
- Seminar has been arranged to offer life skill education and value education to our students.
- Job oriented certificate courses are conducted for our students.
- Recently academic analysis has been made for slow learners.
- Special consultation hour has been arranged for slow learners.
- Career Counselling Cell has started Entry to Service class to enable our students for appearing at competitive exams.
- Concession in fees are allowed to poor students. IQAC coordinator has voluntarily contributed her honorarium for allowing concession to students.

- Jerseys, sports shoes and other sports materials are provided to students who participate in different sports events.
- Gender Audit has been carried out.
- Napkin vending machine has been installed in Girls' toilet.

### 5.2 Efforts made by the institution for tracking the progression

- Analysis of results of students in different university examinations are regularly made at departmental level, by the academic sub-committee and IQAC and finally by the GB.
- After identifying the slow learners among the students admitted in first year classes they are specially nurtured by providing special consultation services before the normal class hours.
- Students at the risk of drop out are specially taken care of, guardians are informed, concession in fees is allowed and possible causes of drop out by students are surveyed by some departments on a regular basis.
- Present position of our ex-students is properly surveyed and regularly documented.

## Criterion – VII

### 7. Innovations and Best Practices

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

- **Cataloguing of Blood Group data** – Blood Donation camps are organised in our College regularly. But of late, the institution has taken a novel initiative to detect and preserve data on the blood-group of its students. The blood-groups so detected are catalogued in the College website. The objective of this exercise is to enable any member of the institution (teaching, non-teaching, student) to access the catalogue at the time of emergency to get a passage straightaway to ready and known donors.
- **Introduction of Assignment Diary by the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication** – This has been done with a view to keeping a regular tab on the students' performance at the departmental level. Assignments issued by teachers have to be countersigned by the individual students after he/she is through with the assignments.
- **Distribution of academic plans to First Year students** – On the first day of the new session, First Year students have been handed out a folder containing Academic Calendar of the College, Unitised syllabus, Class-wise routine, College Prospectus and College magazine. The purpose of this initiative is to inform the students well in advance about all aspects of academic programmes to be carried out during the academic session. This novel exercise has earned wide press coverage and appreciation as an unprecedented exercise among colleges in the state.
- **Curtailing in-house examination hour** - The Department of Journalism and Mass Communication can honestly lay its claim to have introduced certain innovative measures in exams organised by it for its Third Year Honours students by reducing time period of exams by half an hour without affecting the full marks of the paper. This has enormously helped the students to face the final examinations of the University with greater confidence and aplomb. The department's decision to introduce this innovative system stood vindicated once the Third Year Honours results were out.
- **Open Text Book examinations of Department of Bengali and evaluation method** - The students of the Department of Bengali undergo Open Text Book examinations. This is an attempt to make the students learn to assimilate matters from different textbooks, as this is a text-focused

literature and language discipline. After Open Text Book examination, examinees are encouraged to self-assess their scripts. Their perception of credit is authenticated by faculties who again check the scripts. A comparative analysis between self-assessed credit and faculty awarded credit is presented before the concerned students and the rationale in the variance is explained.

#### **Action Taken**

- Seminar on 'Value based education' organised in 2016.
- Department of Journalism, Bengali and Geography organised students' seminar with students in the role of speakers.
- Research cell formed. Budgetary allocation of Rs 50000/- made for a period of 5 years.
- An overall feedback system has been done.
- NSS unit has been revived. It is undertaking programme following the NSS unit of the parent university. College cleaning, sanitising slum areas, arranging rallies on health related and other issues – are some of the activities undertaken by the NSS

#### **Best Practice I**

**Title** – Awareness programme on Thalassemia disease and Thalassemia detection drive

**Goal:** In view of the growing menace of thalassemia and associated tragic consequences, the College has taken upon itself to make its students aware about this danger. The NSS unit of the College is actively involved to spread this awareness. Recently, a thalassemia detection drive through proper blood sampling and testing has been carried out by an expert agency, with a tremendous response from students. The College is in the process of handing out the reports to the students.

**Context:** In recent years the devastating consequence of the thalassemia disease has increased many fold and the miserable sufferers are the children of those parents who were not aware of the fact that both of them are thalassemia carriers. In order to control this miserable consequences and extensive awareness drive is urgently required among the would be parents before their marriage. Realising this as an important social responsibility our institution has taken a sincere drive to sensitise our students in this regard and accordingly undertaken the awareness programme and carrier detection test.

#### **Practice:**

The institution has negotiated with an NGO who provides this service on behalf of the Health Department of the Government of West Bengal and invited them to organise the awareness programme and conduct the carrier detection test.



### **Evidence of Success**

About 200 students took part in the initiative and they have pursued the thalassemia detection test. They have also been motivated to aware other residents of their neighbourhoods and relatives regarding their experiences and awareness about the devastating disease.

**Problems:** Due to infrastructural deficiency and capacity constraints on behalf of the testing organisation, large number of students (although they were interested) could not be accommodated on a single day. However the college has a plan to organise such programme frequently in near future.

### **Best Practice II**

**Title of the practice :** Detection of Blood group of every students and maintaining a data base (blood group wise) of would be donors.

**Goal:** Blood Donation camps are organised in our College regularly. But of late, the institution has taken a novel initiative to detect and preserve data on the blood-group of its students. The blood-groups so detected are catalogued in the College website. The objective of this exercise is to enable any member of the institution (teaching, non-teaching, student) to access the catalogue at the time of emergency to get a passage straightaway to ready and known donors.

**Context:** It is a very unfortunate experience of most of us that in case of emergency donors of a particular blood group and more importantly in respect of a rare blood group not become available. Realising this miserable sufferings of different persons our institution has felt that the necessity of not only organising blood donation camp annually but also has catalogued the details of donors (name, address, phone numbers) of same blood group. This initiative may assist the aggrieved patients in case of urgent necessity for arranging blood of a particular group by taking information from the catalogue prepared by the college.

**Practice:** The college has arranged a Blood Group Detection Test hiring services of pathological laboratory and shoulders all associated costs. More than 200 students participated in the programme. The blood group certificate has been handed over to the students and most importantly the hard copy of the catalogue is being maintained by the college. The soft copy of the catalogue will be uploaded in the college website to ensure easy accession of such catalogue in case of emergency.

**Evidence of Success:** It is a recent initiative and the college is believing it will be of great help to many people which will be evidenced in near future.

**Problems:** Due to infrastructural deficiency and capacity constraints on behalf of the testing organisation, large number of students (although they were interested) could not be accommodated on a single day. However the college has a plan to organise such programme frequently in near future.

### SWOC Analysis of the Institution

#### Strengths

- Highly qualified and diligent faculty members;
- Hardworking teaching support staff who ensure smooth performance of college activities;

- Alert and co-operative Governing Body;

#### Weaknesses

- The college shares its premises with Netaji Nagar Day College which is a separate college. This severely impinges on its time and space for academic activities and its future expansion.
- Insufficient number of teaching and non-teaching members.
- Lack of individual computer laboratory for Commerce and Journalism Departments.
- Absence of a long-awaited Journalism Laboratory.
- Unsatisfactory drop-out rate in a few departments.

#### Opportunities

- The college has adequate road and metro connectivity.
- The Department of Commerce is equipped with highly qualified and experienced faculties to embark on a post-graduation course.
- The former students of the college occupying teaching positions presently are a better job-fit compared to other recruits.
- Bengali department has the potential to run a PG course, given the existing demand base in the absence of evening college running a similar course in the vicinity.
- The own playground provides the scope to establish gymnasiums, physical exercise clubs etc.

- Plans for introducing more job-oriented as well as soft-skill courses in future. B.Ed course may also be introduced.
- Study centre for Open University may be started.

### **Challenges**

- To shrink drop- out rate among first generation learners and economically distressed and working students.
- Developing communicative English skills among students who are conversant only in vernacular.
- Insufficient funds to cater to infrastructure development.
